

Mission

The mission of the Vassar Ecological Preserve is to protect and preserve the ecological diversity of the land to ensure that its educational value will be maintained in perpetuity. The Vassar Ecological Preserve promotes increased understanding and appreciation of the natural systems on the preserve through field-based education and research.

Rules

- No camping or fires.
- No adding or removing plants/animals.
- No altering the landscape.
- Follow a Leave No Trace ethic.
- Only authorized vehicles allowed.
- Pets must be leashed at all times.
- Pets waste must be picked up.
- Special events require prior approval.
- Trails are open from sunrise to sunset.

History & Use

The first piece of the Vassar Farm was purchased in 1895 to create a sewage treatment system. In 1911 the college acquired additional property and created a farm that provided vegetables, meat, and dairy to campus.

1917 brought the rise of the Farmerettes. Vassar girls worked as farmhands over the summer during World War I and World War II because other help was in short supply. In the 1950's farming was discontinued because of rising costs. In 1973 Margaret Wright proposed that the land should become an ecological center. In 1976 Vassar adopted a mix use plan, with education and research at the forefront for land use.

Today the land continues to serve as an education and research facility for Vassar and the surrounding community. It is one of the largest open green spaces in Poughkeepsie. Residents and students are welcome to learn and explore the trails and rich habitats nestled within the preserve.
